Current Situation:


DHS CBP and ICE continue to be challenged with handling the increased migrant population at the Southwest border. DHS Secretary has requested support from DHS Components and OFA in assisting both CBP and ICE with personnel in specific areas, enabling more agents to work the migrant issue. Effective 4 April DHS will operate its interagency coordination efforts from the NRCC.

FEMA Headquarters Actions

- FEMA NRCC Response Operations Cell (ROC) (virtual) (day-shift):
 - Activated to align/coordinate Region VI, Region IX, NWC and HQ programs and actions
 - Will expand to support the DHS Interagency Border Emergency Cell
 - Provide support to the daily Interagency VTC
- Field Operations Directorate (FOD) / Volunteer Force Coordination Center (VFCC):
 - Providing technical assistance to the DHS components on processes to identify & deploy volunteers in pre-identified skill sets (medical, transportation, etc.)
 - Assisting with the establishment of a PMC capable of RSOI oversight immediately


FEMA Regional/Field Support:

River Flood Update: 4/3/19






Regions V, VII, VIII



- Widespread minor to major flooding will continue through April across the Central Plains and Upper Midwest.
 - Includes the Missouri and Mississippi Rivers.
- Snowmelt will continue across the Northern Plains into the upper Great Lakes.
- A slow and gentle melt continues across the Red River basin due to favorable temperatures and dry weather conditions.
- River rises are expected through April due to spring snowmelt across upper Midwest and Northern Plains.
- Renewed flooding could occur across the Midwest and lower Missouri Valley if heavy rainfall materializes.
- In South Dakota, North Dakota and Minnesota peak river levels will be contingent upon future precipitation.
 - If significant precipitation happens to occur (especially concurrent with peak snowmelt rises), river levels will be prone to reaching higher levels.







- The crest on the Mississippi River will approach St. Louis, MO today and the crest on the Lower Ohio River are not expected until the weekend. The combination of rises from both the Mississippi and Ohio Rivers will result in rises of one to four feet from Cairo, IL downstream to Tuncia, MS.
- Due to elevated stages on the Lower Mississippi River, the rises will be reduced to steady conditions by the time it reaches Arkansas City, AR in two weeks.
- The future rainfall over the next 16 days shows crests two to three feet higher at Cairo, IL for the third week of April. This rise would be lower than previous flood crests and it would keep the Lower Mississippi River at elevated stages through April and into May.
- The USACE continues to operate the Bonnet Carrè Spillway and additional bays will be closed in the coming weeks to reduce discharges and keep New Orleans, LA from reaching the 17.0 ft flood stage level.
- For smaller tributaries, minor flooding will continue over portions of Arkansas, Louisiana, and Mississippi.










Severe Weather Outlook










Precipitation Forecast






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
