- Wildfire Activity Northern California\Oregon\Washington

Tropical Activity:

- Atlantic Tropical Storm Bertha
- Eastern Pacific Hurricane Iselle; Tropical Storm Julio
- Central Pacific Tropical Depression Genevieve

Significant Weather:

- Scattered strong thunderstorms Central Plains into the Ohio Valley
- Flash Flooding Central Great Basin, Northern Intermountain, Central Rockies, Northern & Central Plains
- Space Weather None
- Elevated Fire Weather WA & OR; Red Flag Warnings WA, OR & CA

Water Restrictions – OH & MI (Final)



Water Restrictions - OH & MI

- August 1-3: Approx. 500K residents in Northern Ohio & Southeast Michigan under not Drink/Do not Boil" advisories due to algae bloom toxins in water treatment plant
- August 4 EPA tests found water within acceptable limits for drinking
- All "Do not Drink/Do not Boil" advisories lifted
- · Water distribution points have closed
- The public was asked to conserve non-essential water usage to help the water treatment plant as it returns to full operation
- No widespread health/security incidents/concerns from exposure

State Response

- Ohio State officials are demobilizing (OH Infrastructure Protection/Protective Security Advisor)
- Ohio Governor declared a state of emergency
- Ohio EOC remains at Partial Activation
- MI EOC remained at Normal Operations

FEMA Response


- FEMA Region V RRCC decreased status to Level III
- RV LNO is demobilized; IMAT is no longer on standby for this event
- No requests for FEMA assistance




Monroe County, MI Fulton, Wood and Lucas counties, OH

Hurricane Iselle (CAT 3) (as of 5:00 a.m. EDT)


- Located 1,115 miles east of Hilo, HI
- Moving W at 8 mph
- Should make a turn WNW at a faster forward speed later today/Wednesday
- Maximum sustained winds 125 mph (Category 3 Hurricane)
- Further weakening forecast next couple days
- Hurricane-force winds extend 35 miles, tropical storm-force winds extend 105 miles
- No Watches/Warnings in effect; Watches may be required for HI islands today or Wednesday; 6-10+ inches of rain, flash flooding & coastal inundation possible
- FEMA Region IX prepared to deploy IMAT team & select ESFs, as needed


<u>Tropical Depression Genevieve (as of 5:00 a.m. EDT)</u>

- Located 1,085 miles SW of Honolulu, Hawaii
- Moving WNW at 16 mph this motion will continue
- Maximum sustained winds are near 35 mph, 55 km/h, with higher gusts
- Gradual strengthening is forecast today

Tropical Storm Julio (as of 5:00 a.m. EDT)


- Located 1,110 miles WSW of the southern tip of Baja California, Mexico
- Moving W at 15 mph
- Maximum sustained winds 60 mph
- Strengthening forecast during the next 48 hours
- Expected to become a hurricane Wednesday
- Tropical storm-force winds extend 105 miles
- No coastal Watches/Warnings in effect


Disturbance 1 (as of 5:00 a.m. EDT)

- Located several hundred miles SSE of Acapulco, Mexico
- · Shower & thunderstorm activity has increased
- Conditions expected to gradually improve the next few days
- Moving WNW at 10-15 mph
- Formation chance through 48 hours: Medium (30%)
- Formation chance through 5 days: Medium (30%)

Tropical Outlook – Atlantic







Tropical Storm Bertha (as of 5:00 a.m. EDT)

- 475 miles west of Bermuda
- Moving NNE at 22 mph
- Maximum sustained winds 65 mph
- A turn NE with increasing speed expected later today/Wednesday
- Forecast to pass midway between U.S. east coast & Bermuda later this morning
- Gradual weakening forecast during next 48 hours
- Tropical storms force-winds extend outward 125 miles
- No coastal watches/warnings in effect
- No unmet needs and no requests for FEMA assistance



 - Hazard Mitigation statewide








National Weather Forecast






Precipitation Forecast – 3 Day





Precipitation Forecast -4 - 5 Days








Convective Outlook, Days 1-3






Fire Weather Outlook, Days 1 - 8


- DR 4145 in Colorado received the most public assistance grants over the past week, at \$37.4 million




