




Potential Tropical Cyclone Three SATELLITE LOOP



Potential Tropical Cyclone Three FORECAST TRACK





Potential Tropical Cyclone Three PEAK STORM SURGE FORECAST


3 DAY RAINFALL


7- Day Flood Hazard Outlook

Flood Hazard Messages

associated with Potential Tropical Cyclone 3

- Along the coast of southeastern Louisiana through western Florida, and into portions of southeastern Mississippi and Alabama, heavy rainfall, associated with a Potential Tropical Cyclone 3, will likely cause considerable flash, urban and small stream flooding impacts through the weekend. New and renewed river rises to minor and moderate flood will persist well into next week.
- Across the remainder of the Central Gulf Coast and into portions of the Southeast, limited flash, urban and small stream flooding impacts and minor river flooding are possible into early next week.
- Current River Forecast Center forecasts contain 48-hours of forecast precipitation; therefore, additional flood forecasts are expected as rainfall moves inland. Interests across the Southeast should continue to monitor the situation closely for possible flood impacts through the weekend.
- Additional rainfall (up to 2 inches) early next week across this same region may exacerbate flooding.

Potential Tropical Cyclone Three – Preparations


<u>Situation:</u> At 8:00 a.m. ET, Potential Tropical Cyclone Three was 255 miles south of Morgan City, LA. A subtropical or tropical depression/storm is likely to form over the west-central or northern Gulf of Mexico later today. Regardless of development, heavy rains, storm surge, and tornadic activity should begin to affect portions of the central Gulf Coast today.

State/Local Preparations:

- LA EOC at Monitoring with Crisis Action Team activated; Governor declared state of emergency; 5 parishes issued emergency declarations, begun sandbagging operations
- No shortfalls or requests for assistance


FEMA/Federal Preparations:

- FEMA Region IV RRCC at Level III (COVID-19), will de-activate from COVID-19 response at 3:30 p.m. ET; rostered and available to support tropical storm impacts; IMAT-1/2 available
- FEMA Region VI RRCC at Level III (COVID-19); IMAT-1/2 available
- FEMA HQ
 - NRCC at Level III (COVID); rostered for full activation for tropical storm impacts
 - NWC is monitoring; Enhanced Watch is rostered
 - National IMAT teams identified for immediate deployment
 - US&R have been identified and are available for deployment
 - MERS: communications resources available from Denton, TX and Thomasville, GA
 - Logistics: 4 ISB teams on alert; distribution centers stocked and on-call for immediate response






Severe Weather Outlook







Precipitation & Excessive Rainfall





Fire Weather Outlook




