Partial Building Collapse – Surfside, FL

<u>Current Situation</u>: At 1:51 a.m. ET last night a 13-story apartment/condo building partially collapsed in Surfside, FL. Extent of damage and cause of the collapse is unknown at this time, but there are indications that an unknown number of people trapped in the building. Over 74 first responder units are on scene to assist Miami Beach Fire Department. There have been no requests for state or FEMA assistance

Impacts: (source: FEMA Region IV SPOTREP as of 4:46 a.m. ET; U&SR as of 6:19 a.m. ET) Safety & Security:

- 72 of the 136 units involved in the collapse; remaining structure compromised
- Unknown number of individuals trapped

Food, Water, & Sheltering


- Residents in unaffected portions of the structure have been evacuated Health & Medical
- 20+ injuries / 1 fatality reported at this time

- FL EOC at Partial Activation (COVID-19)





- FL TF-1 & TF-2 is green for national-level response




Tropical Outlook – Five Day

Central Pacific





- Conditions conducive for further development as the system moves WNW at 10 mph
- 48-hour formation chance: High (80%)

Disturbance 1 (As of 8:00 a.m. ET)


- 200 miles E of Barbados
- Further development unlikely
- 48-hour formation chance: Low (10%)
- 5-day formation chance: Low (10%)

Disturbance 2 (As of 8:00 a.m. ET)

- Tropical wave expected to emerge off the coast of Africa
- Small tropical depression could form next week
- 48-hour formation chance: Low (near 20%)
- 5-day formation chance: Low (40%)




National Weather Forecast






Severe Weather Outlook






Precipitation & Excessive Rainfall


