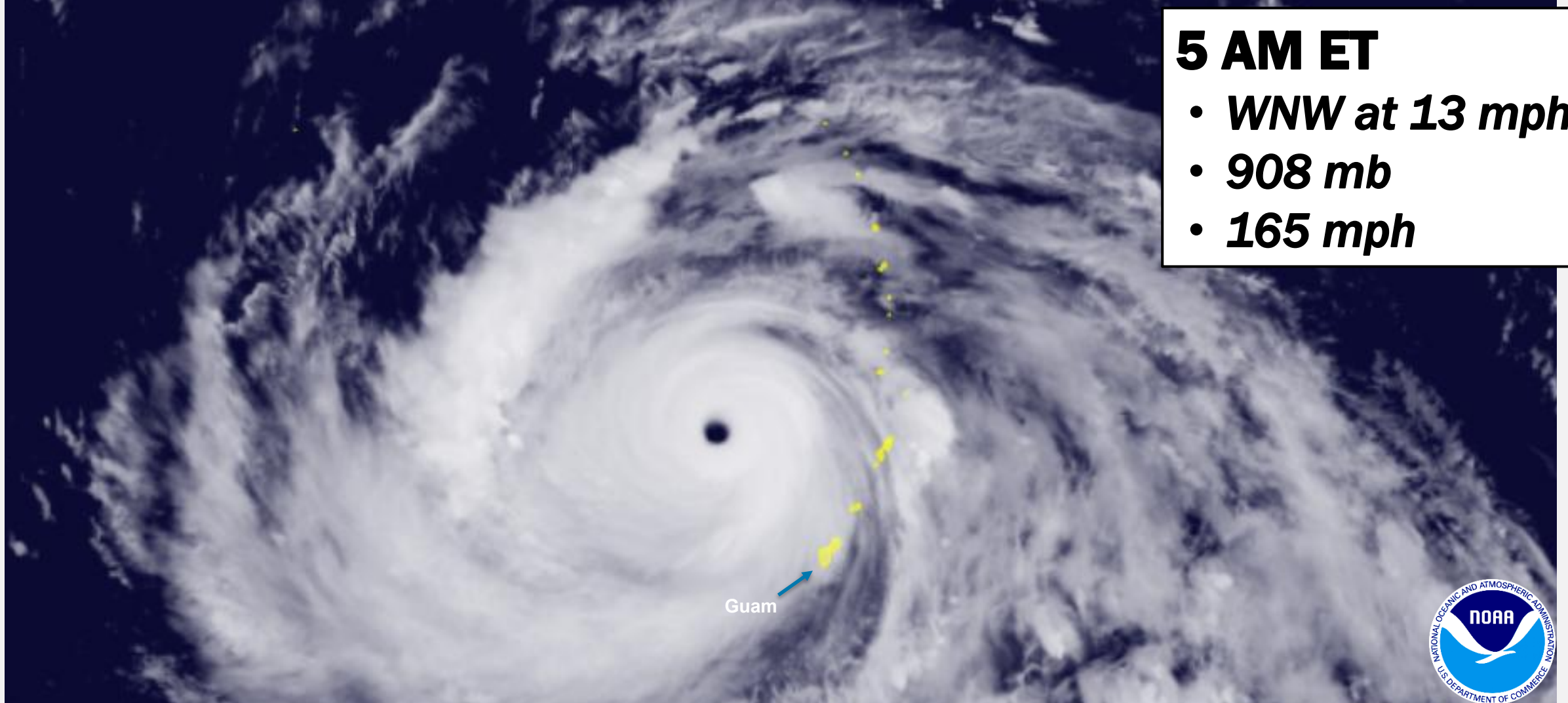

SATELLITE LOOP



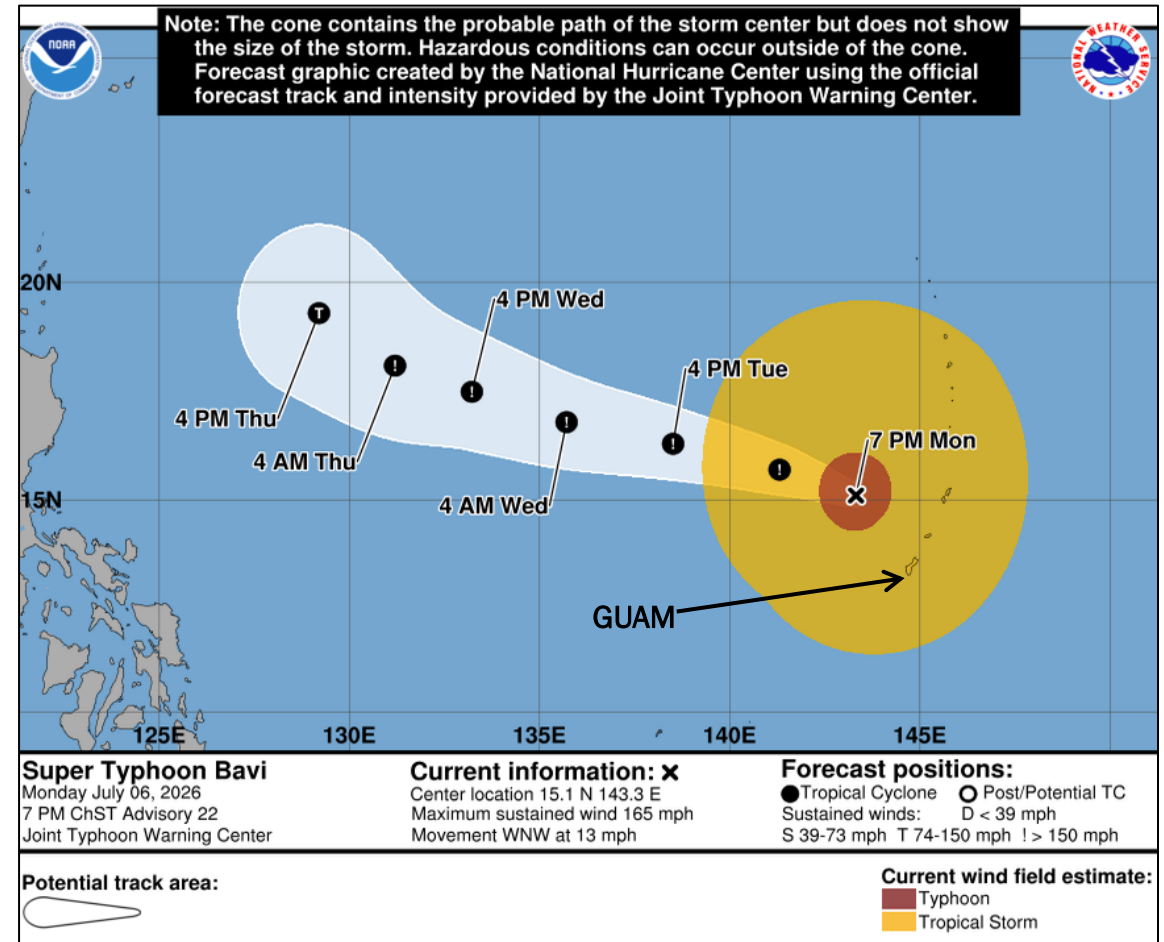
Super Typhoon Bavi (CAT-5) – Western Pacific

Situation: (HLT and JTWC Advisory #22, as of 6:00 a.m. ET)

- Located **150 miles NW** of Guam
- Moving **WNW** at **13** mph
- Maximum sustained winds of **165** mph
- Tropical Storm force winds extend outward up to **320** miles from center
- Typhoon force winds extend outward from center up to **70** miles
- **Forecast to remain a CAT 5 Super Typhoon as Bavi continues pulling away from the Marianas**

Hazards Affecting Land:

- Wind: **Sustained winds decreasing following eyewall passage;** Tropical Storm force winds are expected to **continue through Monday evening ET over CNMI;** Typhoon Warnings continue in Guam, Rota, Tinian, and Saipan
- Rain: Flash Flood Warnings **remain** in effect for Guam, Rota, Tinian, and Saipan. Already, 2 to 3 inches of rain have fallen, and localized rainfall totals may approach 20 inches, especially on Rota
- Storm Surge: **Coastal Flood Warning in effect through 2am Tuesday ET, for Guam, Rota, Tinian, and Saipan.** Coastal inundation from storm surge and wave run-up could reach up to 12 feet

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Situation: Super Typhoon Bavi remains a strong, large Category 5 typhoon. Winds are decreasing across Rota and the Marianas following the passage of the eyewall, though Extreme weather conditions are expected to last on all island through Tuesday, July 7. The islands are under typhoon, coastal flood, and high wind warnings (FEMA R9 SLB, as of 11:00 p.m. ET, Jul 5).

Lifeline Impacts: (FEMA R9 SLB, as of 11:00 p.m. ET, Jul 5)

Safety and Security:

GU: Rescue units may relocate to higher ground; water rescue units will not respond

Food, Hydration, Shelter: Shelters remain open and available

CNMI:

- Volunteers Organization Active in Disaster (VOAD) distributed 330 (+10) cases of water in Saipan and Rota
- 8 (-1) total shelters open / 515 (+102) occupants
 - Saipan: 5 shelters open / 402 (+40) occupants
 - Tinian: 2 shelters open / 61 (+10) occupants
 - Rota: 1 shelters open / 52 (+52) occupants

GU: 5 shelters open / 868 (+868) occupants

Health and Medical: Local healthcare facilities are adapting operations to support patients

CNMI:

- Generator for Rota Health Center inoperable
- In Saipan, all program offices, clinics, and services will be closed until “all clear” declared

GU: Radiology Consultants to open radiology wing for sheltering electronically-dependent individuals

Energy: Loss of power reported across the islands

CNMI:

- Commonwealth Utilities Corporation (CUC) reports islands possess varying levels of fuel reserves for power generation:
 - Saipan: 19 / Tinian: 21 / Rota: 7-8
- Generators for DR-4910-MP posture for post-impact needs
- All Shell and Mobil gas stations are closed
- Next scheduled fuel deliveries Jul 7 for Tinian, Jul 17 for Rota

GU:

- Power is out in Southern Guam as a result of Super Typhoon Bavi impacts, and 25% of distribution feeders are online throughout the island
- Crews are prepared to begin assessments and restoration efforts as soon as winds decrease to safe levels

Water Systems: Regional and wastewater systems remain operational

CNMI:

- Water distribution in Saipan continues to be facilitated through tank service areas
 - Tinian water system is online, running on generator power
 - Boil Water Notice for Rota and Saipan are in effect
- 44 wastewater treatment facilities on Saipan were successfully connected to the CUC power grid prior to Typhoon Bavi landfall

GU:

- No reports of water outages, 97 water wells online
- Guam Waterworks Authority (GWA) will not shut the water distribution system off during the storm. 59 of the 97 wells online are operating on generator power
- All wastewater treatment plans reliant on generator power

Communications: Communications outages reported across the territory

CNMI:

- Cellular infrastructure:
 - Saipan: 20 of 36 Docomo Cellular sites (56%) out of service
 - Tinian: 3 of 4 Docomo Cellular sites (75%) out of service
 - Rota: 2 of 7 Docomo Cellular sites (29%) out of service

Transportation: All ports in CNMI closed

CNMI:

- All STAR Marianas (primary inter-island airline) flights in CNMI cancelled
- All ports on Saipan, Tinian, and Rota are at Limited Port Heavy Weather Condition
- Saipan mass transit services suspended until further notice

GU:

- All highways open. Guam National Guard on standby to cover Traffic Control Points
- Airport remains open; all flight cancellations remain in effect

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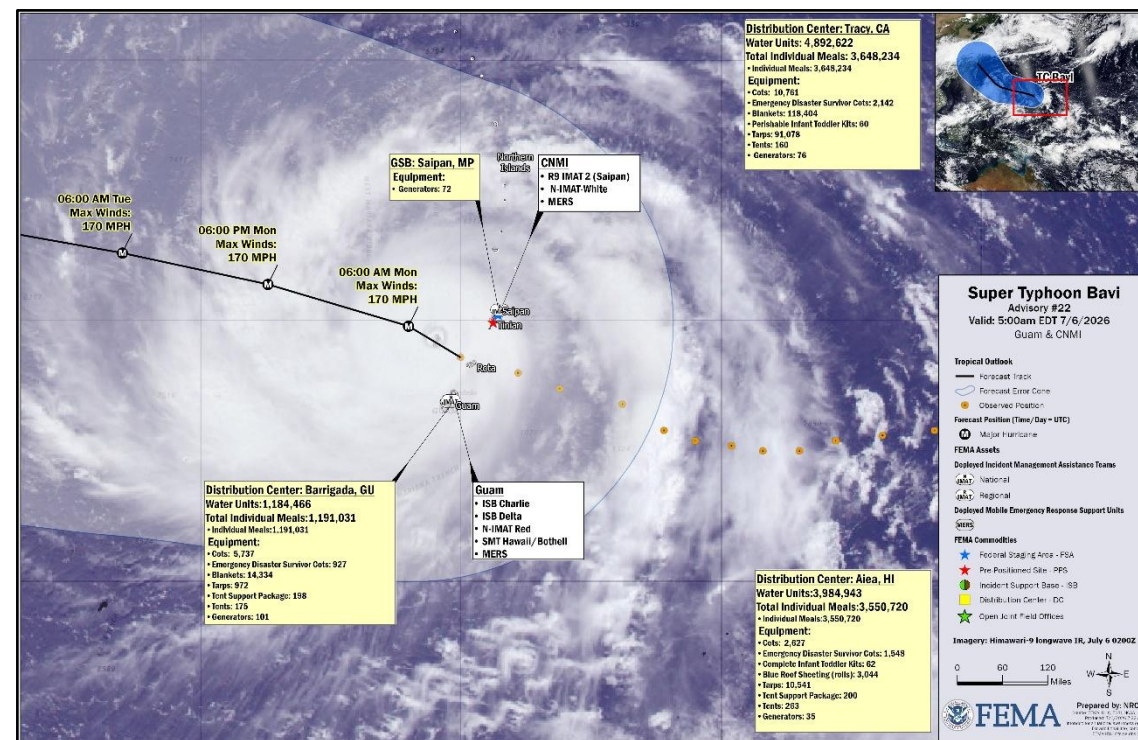

- FEMA Region 9:
 - MP EOC at Full Activation (TC Sinlaku/TC Bavi); Governor requested an Emergency Declaration on Jul 2; approved on Jul 3 (EM-3547-MP)
 - GU EOC at Full Activation (TC Bavi); Governor declared State of Emergency Jul 2, requested an Emergency Declaration on Jul 2; approved on Jul 3 (EM-3648-GU)

Federal / FEMA Response: (FEMA Region 9 SPOTREP Update #20, as of 11:47 p.m. ET, Jul 5)

- FEMA Region 9:
 - R-IMAT 1 Deployed to HI (DR-4909-HI); R-IMAT 2 Deployed to CNMI (DR-4910-MP)
 - ISB Delta Deployed to CNMI (DR-4910-MP)
 - RRCC at Steady State (will activate 10:00 a.m. – 10:00 p.m. ET day shift only)
 - FIT LNOs and selected ESFs Activated for GU and CNMI
- FEMA HQ:
 - NWC at Enhanced Watch; NRCC Activated day shift only (10:00 a.m. – 10:00 p.m. ET) (TC Bavi)
 - N-IMAT Red Deployed to GU
 - N-IMAT White Deployed to CNMI
 - ISB Charlie, SMT Hawaii, and SMT Bothell Deployed to GU
 - ISB Alpha Deployed to HI
 - Bothell MERS personnel deployed to Guam and CNMI
 - Response Operations coordination call was held with FEMA Region 9 on Jul 1

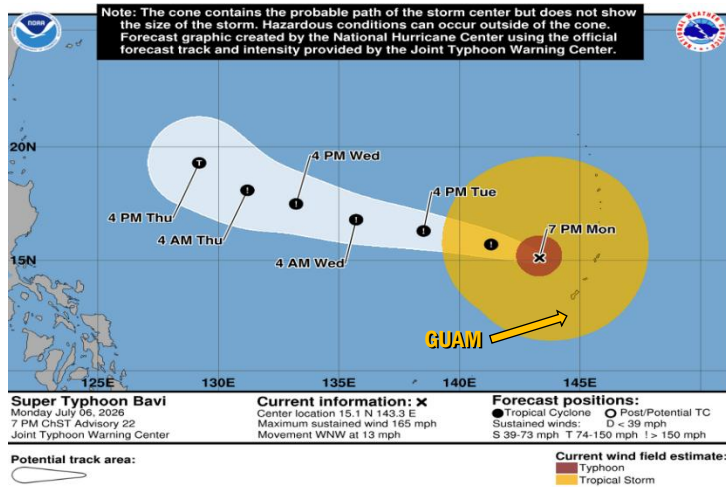

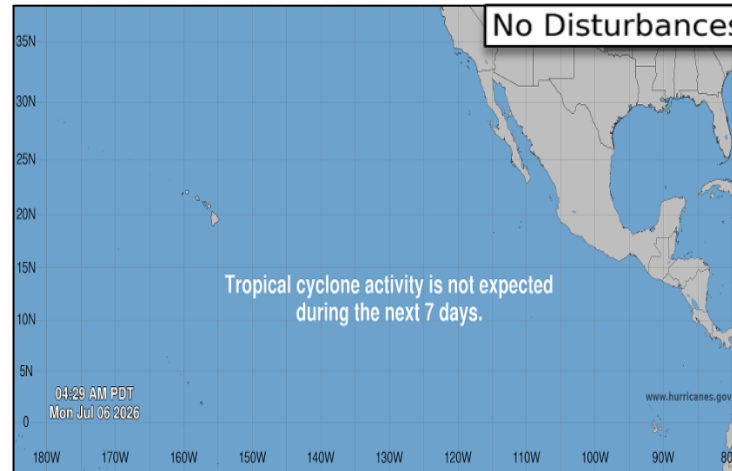

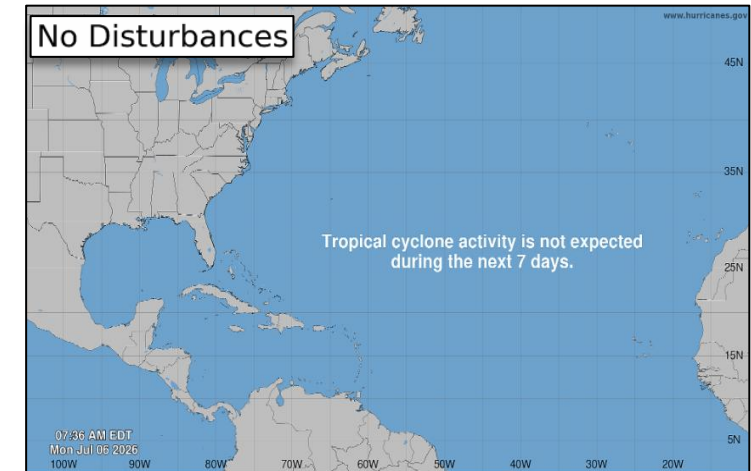

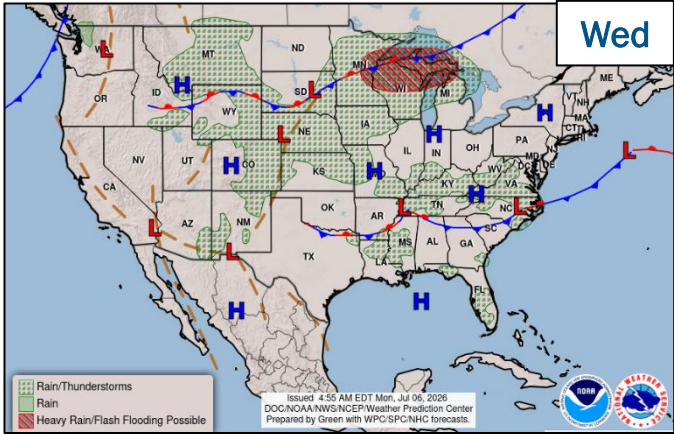
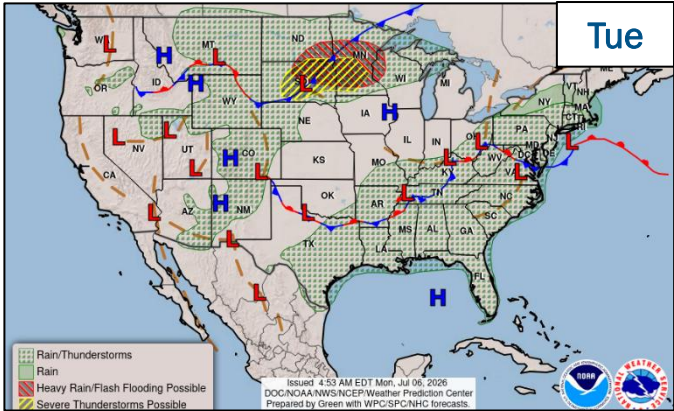
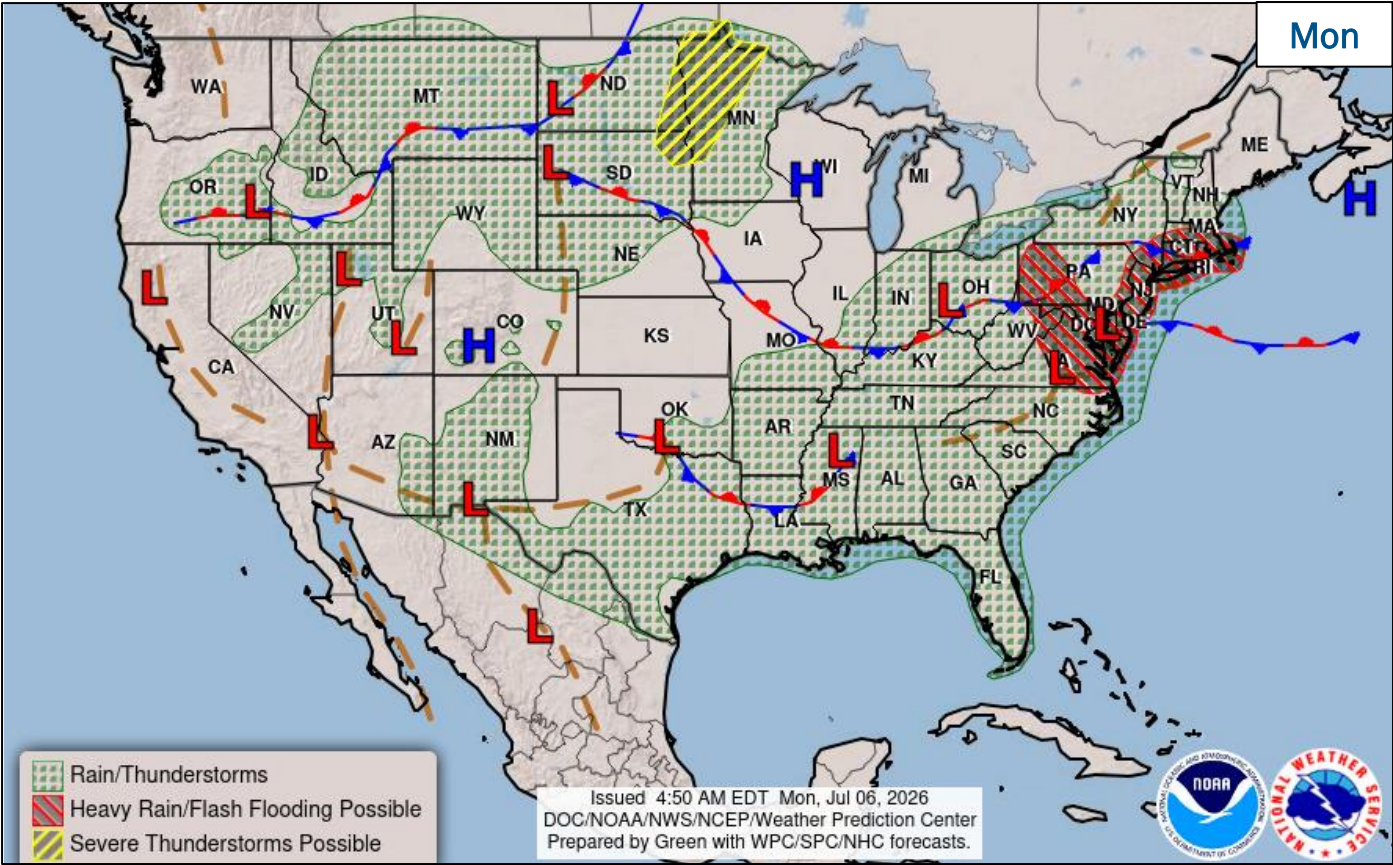
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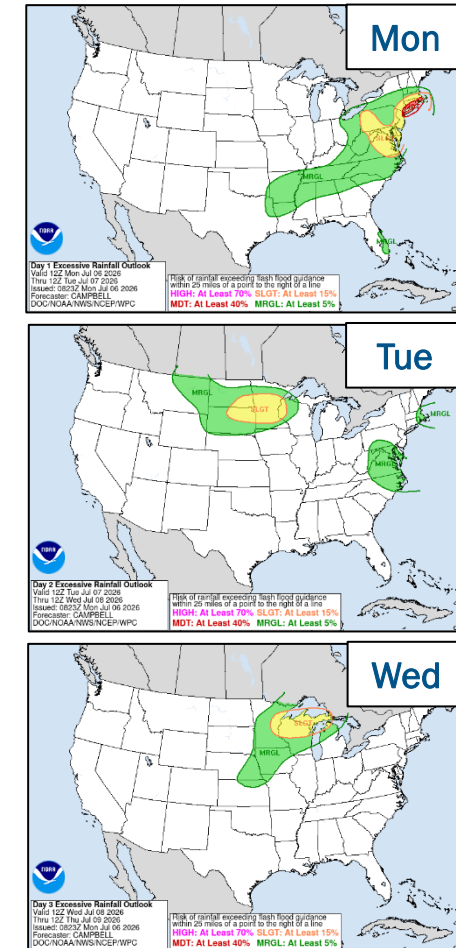
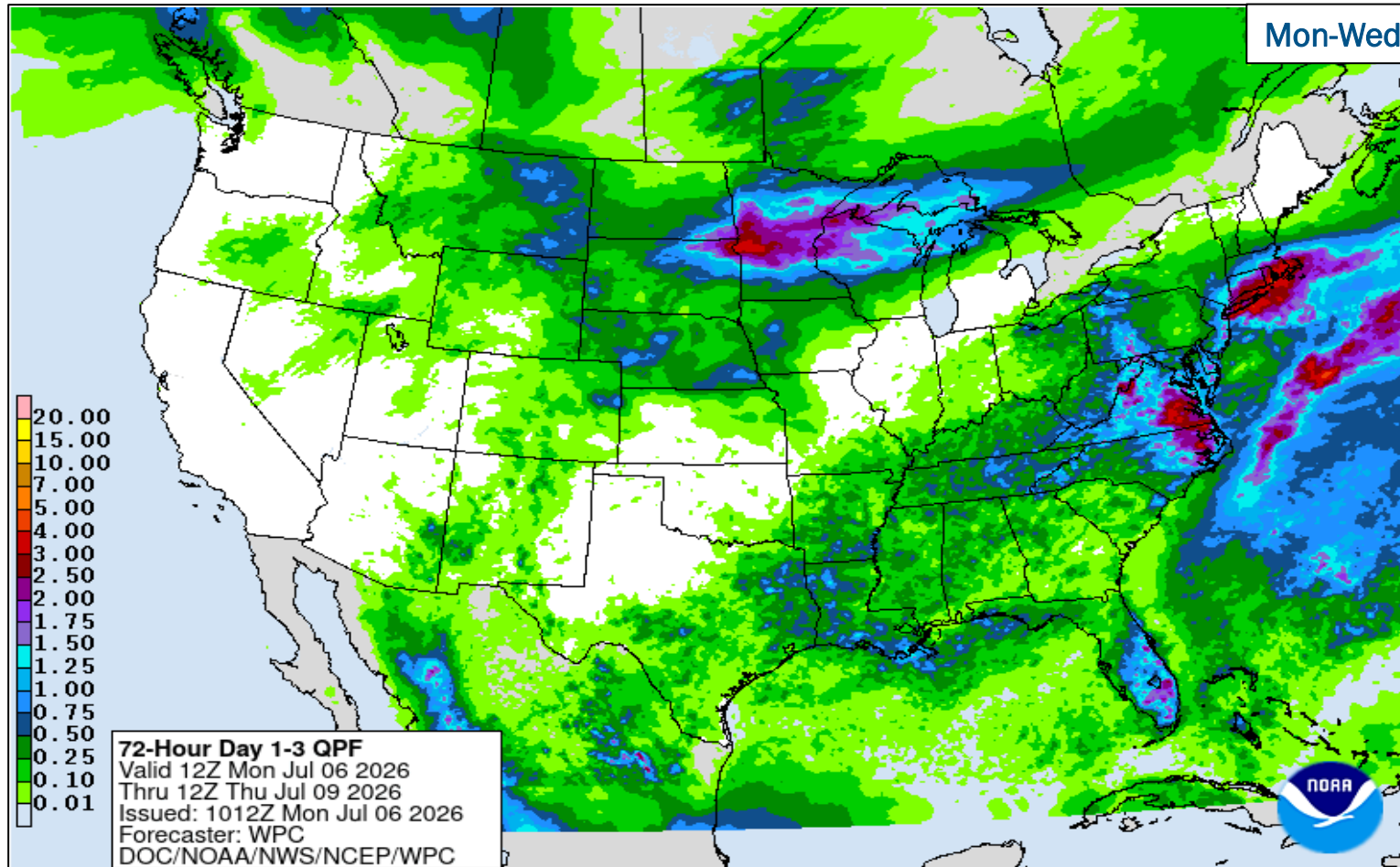
National Weather Forecast



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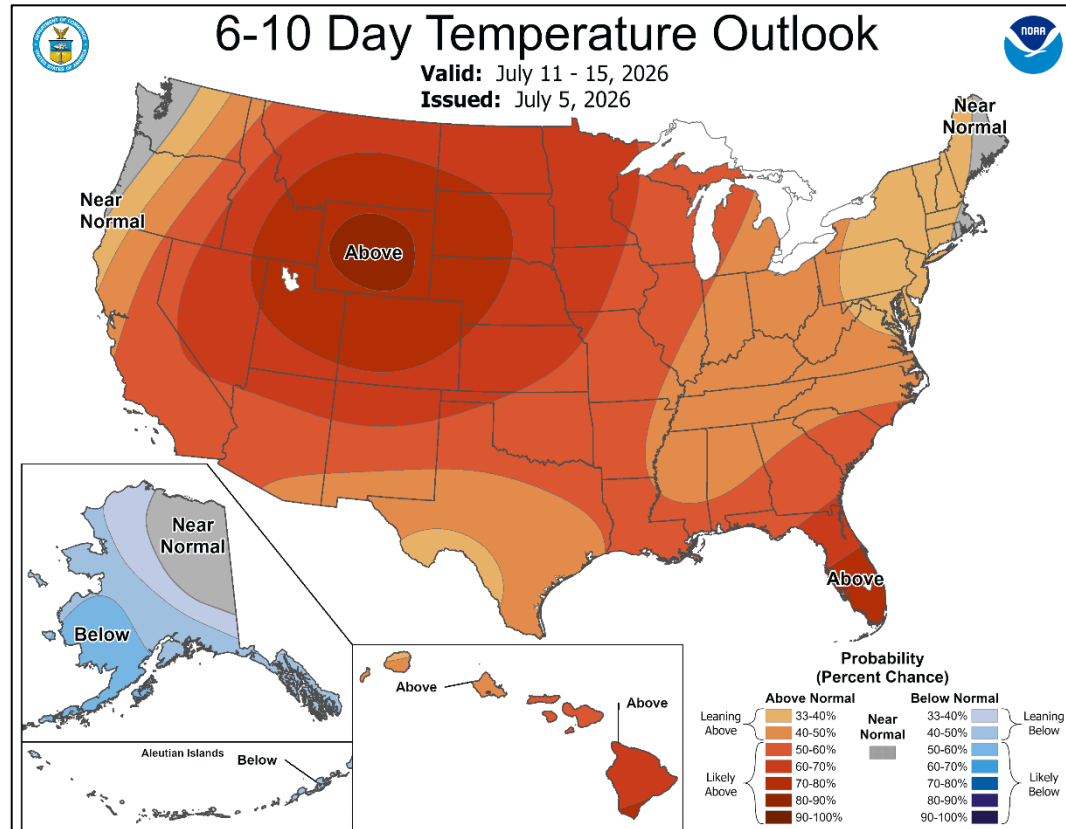
Precipitation & Excessive Rainfall



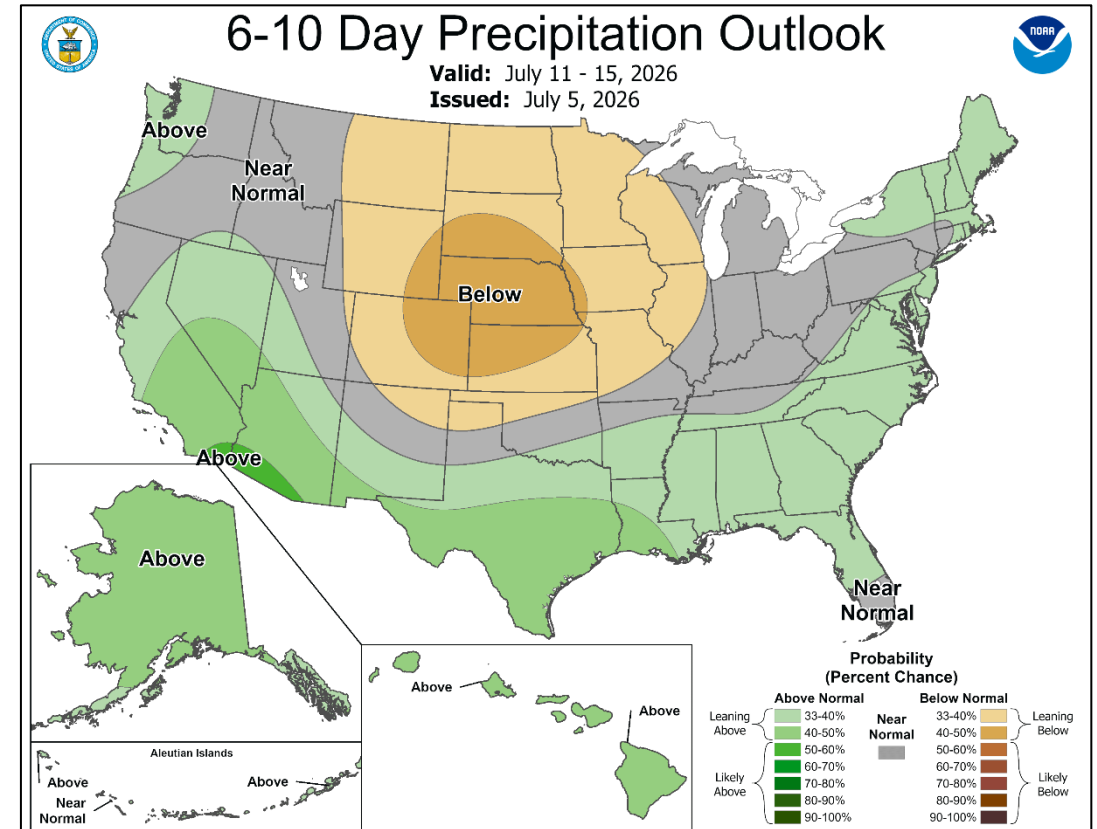
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Long Range Outlooks – Jul 11-15

6-10 Day Precipitation Probability

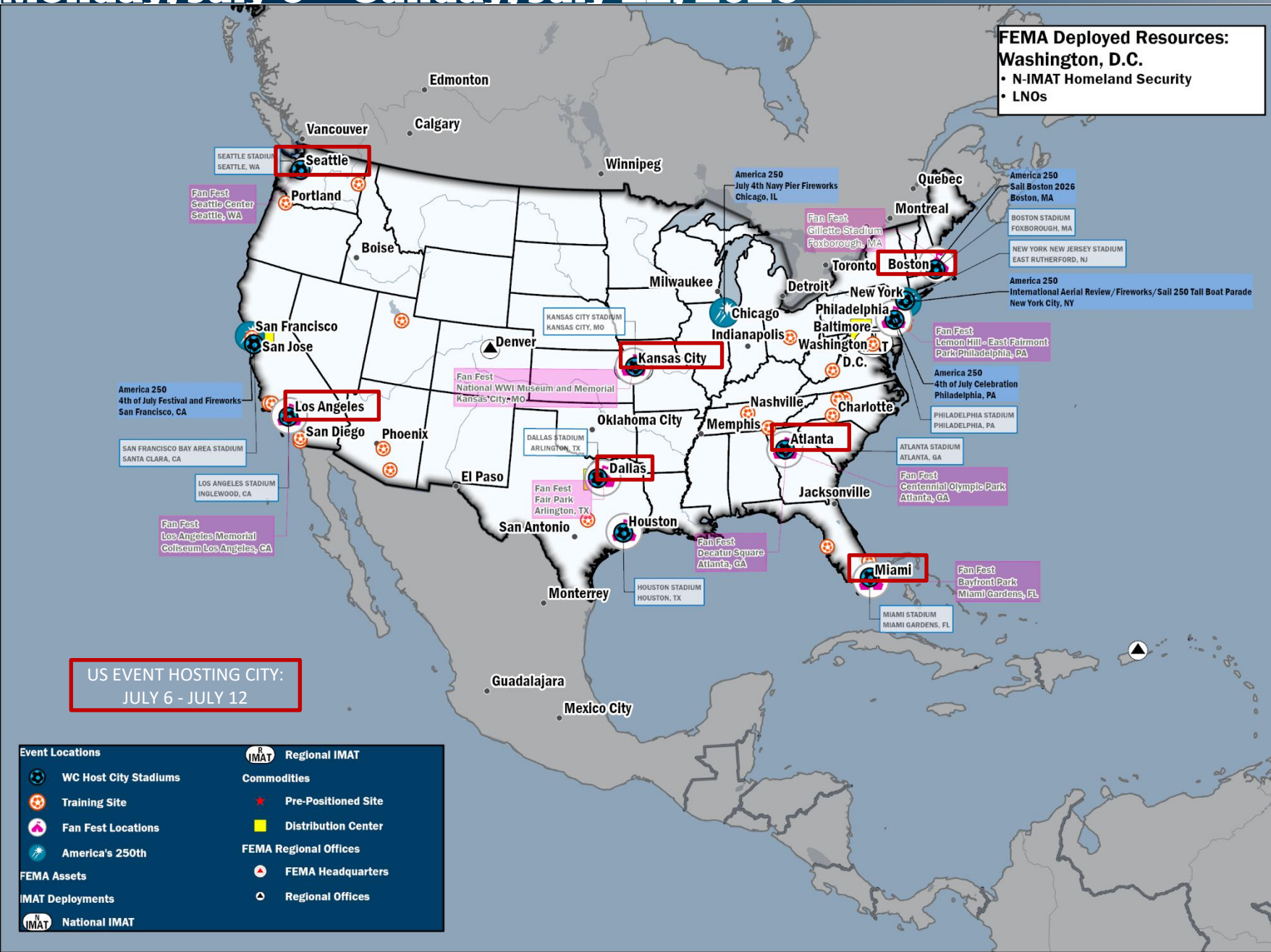


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FIFA 2026 World Cup/America 250th: Weekly Forecast

FEMA remains the lead for consequence management.

FEMA Response/Preps

- FEMA CBRN Support Directorate team members conducted detection operations at FIFA WC26 fanfest sites in all 11 US host cities, as well as in/around stadium complexes for those hosting matches
- FEMA R2 RRCC is Activated (WC26) day shift only
- FEMA R4 RWC at Enhanced Watch (WC26)

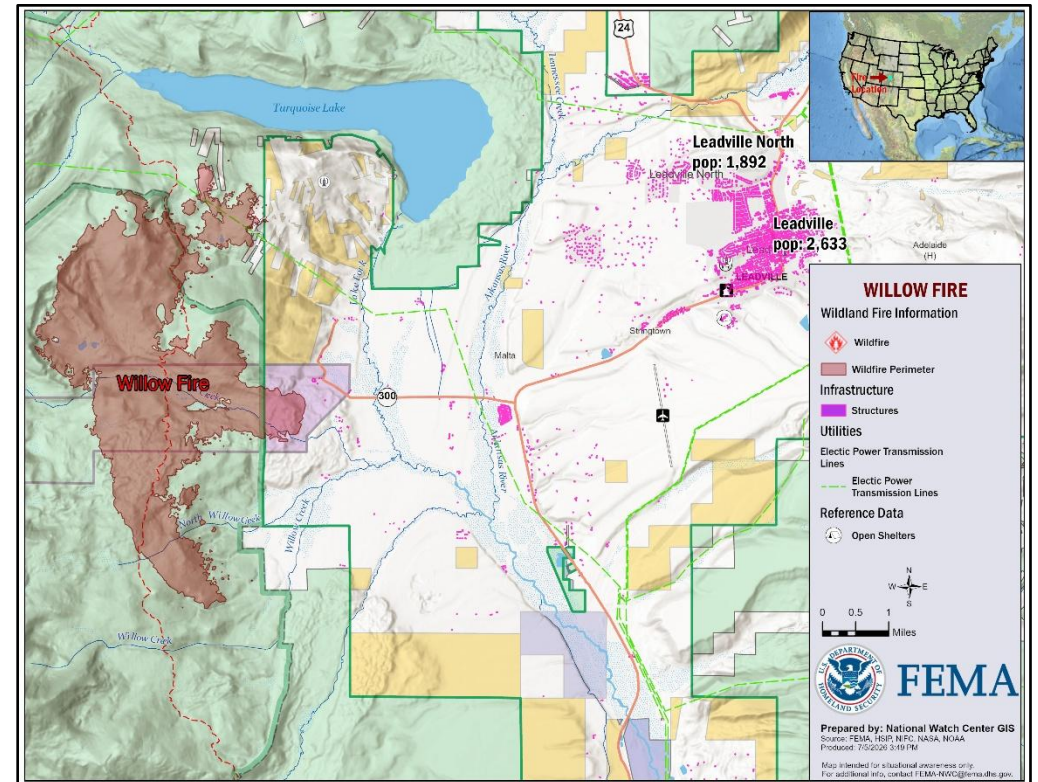

Situation: The Acting FEMA Region 8 Regional Administrator has approved a Fire Management Assistance Grant (FMAG) for Willow Fire, which has burned approximately 3,957 acres and is 1% contained. The fire is burning on federal land near the Town of Leadville (pop 3K). No additional federal assistance has been requested at this time.

- NWC at Enhanced Watch (FIFA World Cup / America 250)



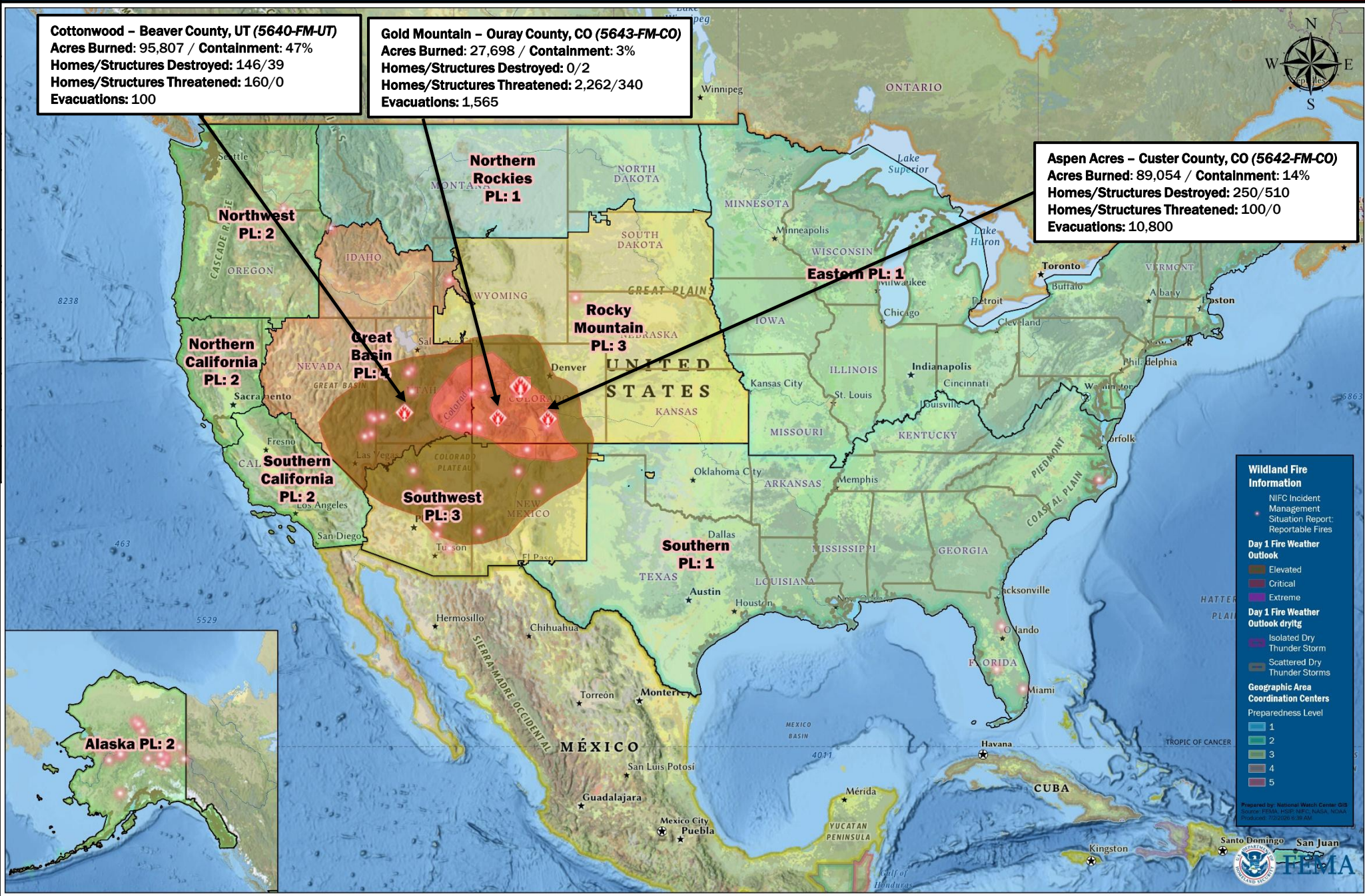
