Significant Activity: July 6-7



Significant Events: Typhoon Nangka (11W)

Tropical Activity:

- Atlantic: Tropical cyclone activity not expected next 48 hours
- Eastern Pacific: Disturbance 1 (High 90%)
- Central Pacific: Disturbance 1 (High 90%); Disturbance 2 (Low 10%); Disturbance 3 (Medium 40%)
- Western Pacific: Typhoon Nangka (11W)

Significant Weather:

- Strong to severe weather – Northern High Plains and Ohio Valley into the Lower Great Lakes
- Rain and thunderstorms – A majority of the U.S. with the exception of portions of the Plains
- Flash flooding possible – Central/Southern Plains to Middle Mississippi Valley; Central Great Basin and Central Rockies
- Red Flag Warnings: CA, OR, WA, ID and MT
- Isolated Dry Thunderstorms: OR, WA, ID and MT; Elevated Fire Weather Areas: OR and WA

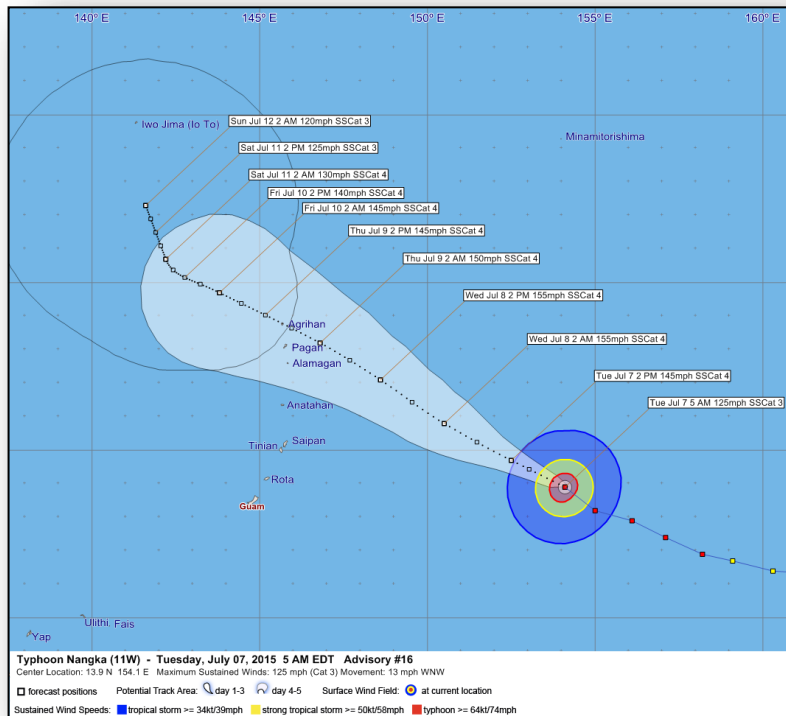
Space Weather:

- Past 24 hours: Minor (R1) radio blackouts occurred; Next 24 hours: no space weather storms predicted

Declaration Activity:

- Request for Major Disaster Declaration - WY

Western Pacific – Typhoon Nangka (11W)



As of 5:00 a.m. EDT

- Located 630 miles E of Guam
- Moving WNW at 13 mph, will turn NW later
- Maximum sustained winds 125 mph (strong Cat 3)
- Typhoon force winds extend outward up to 35 miles from center
- Tropical storm force winds extend outward up to 120 miles center
- Expected to steadily intensify over the next few days
- A typhoon watch remains in effect for Agrihan, Pagan, and Alamagan islands (Northern Marianas)

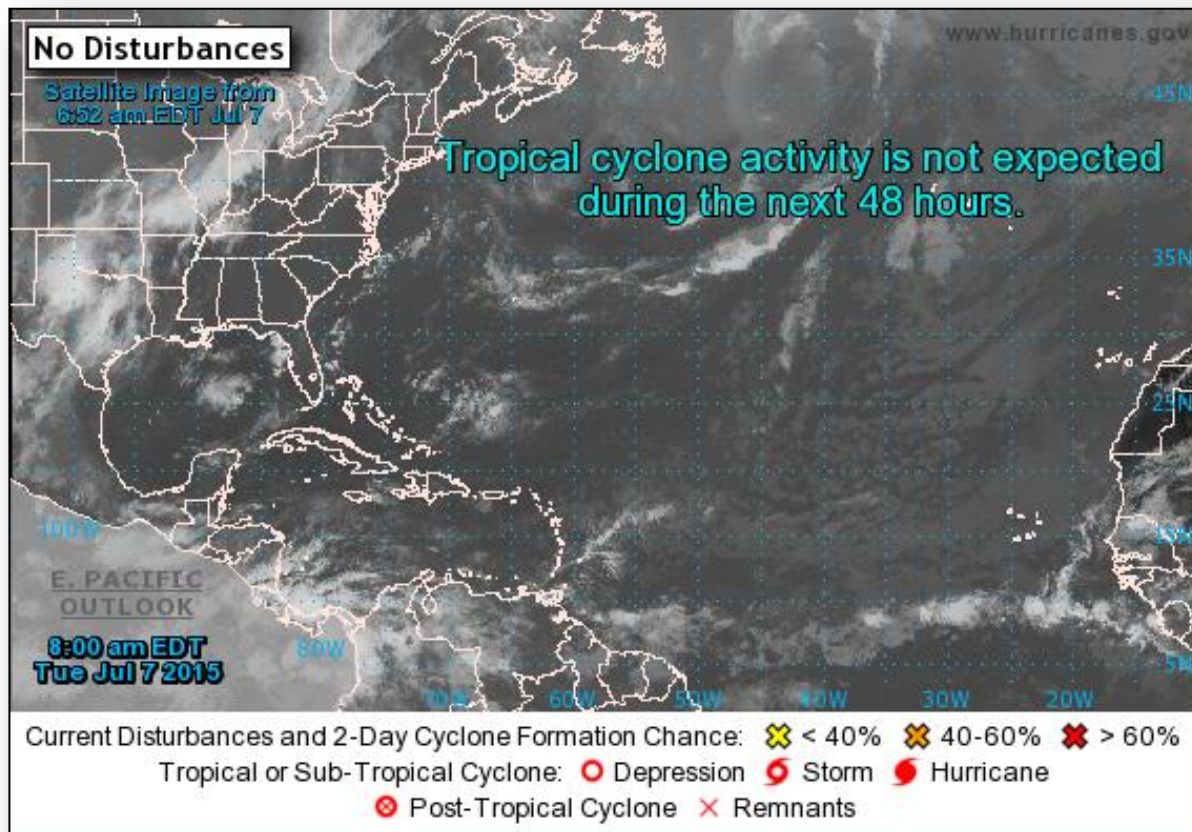

2-Day Tropical Outlook – Atlantic



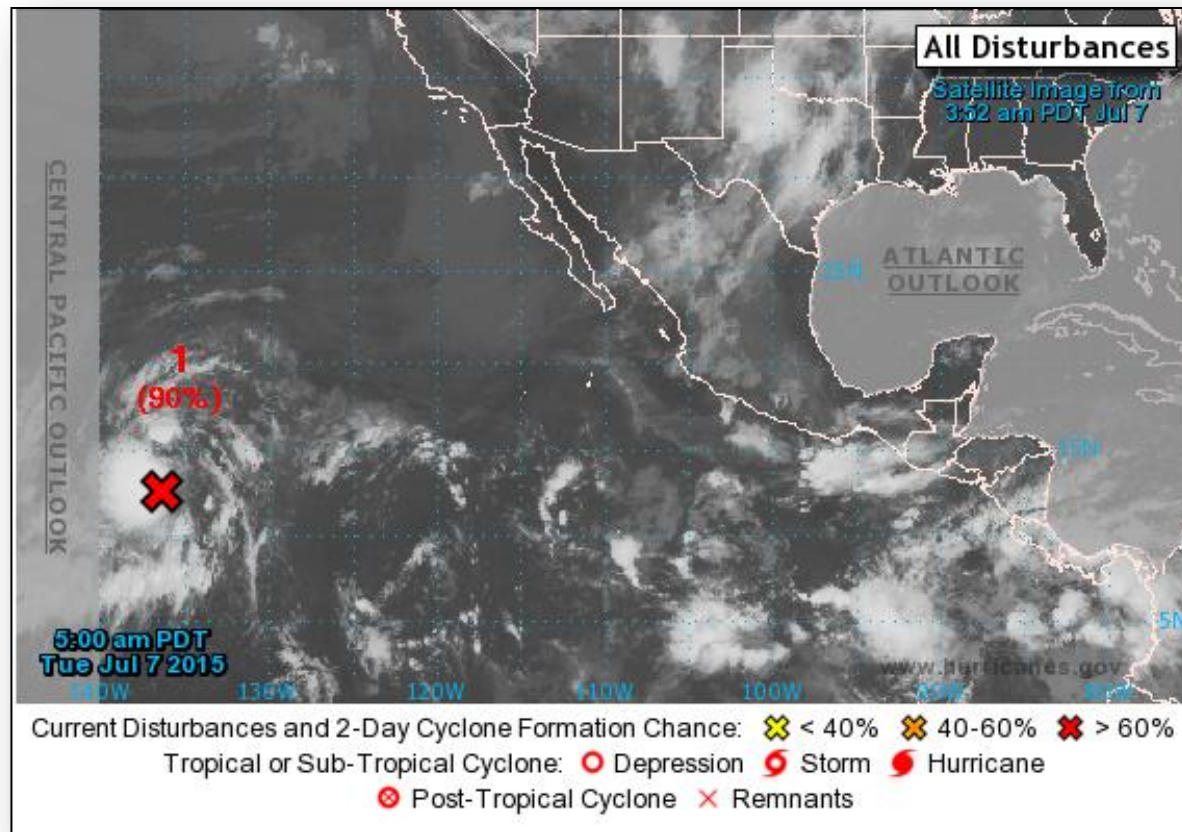
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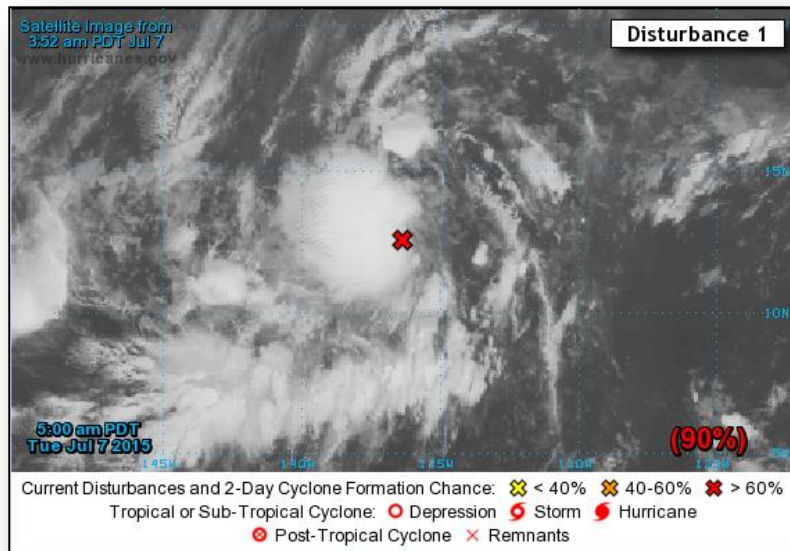
2-Day Tropical Outlook – Eastern Pacific



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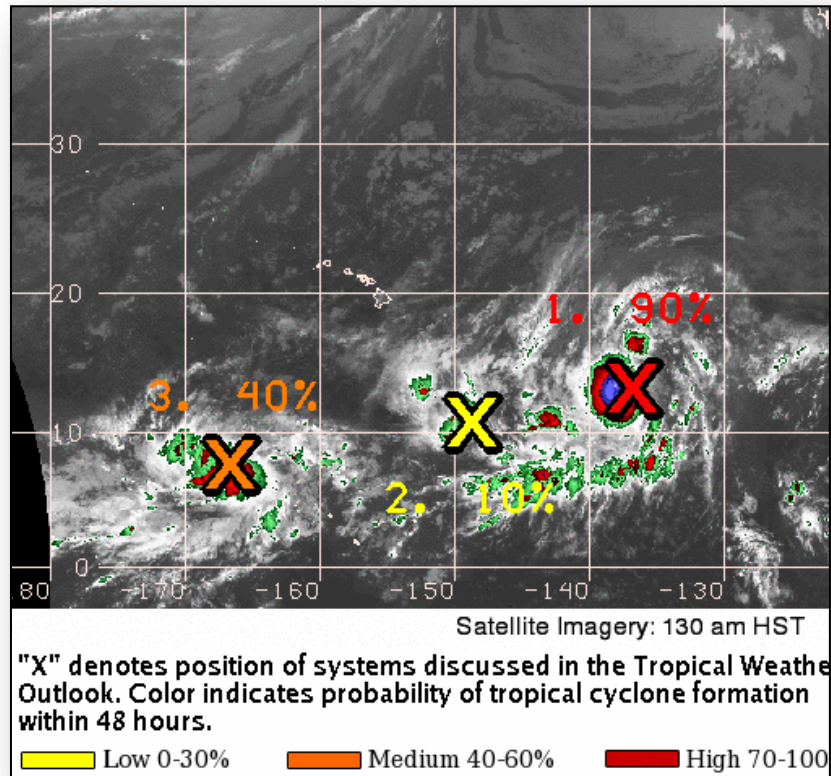
Eastern Pacific – Disturbance 1



Disturbance 1: (as of 2:00 a.m. EDT)

- Large area of showers and thunderstorms 1,300 miles ESE of the Big Island of Hawaii, moving WNW at 15-20 mph
- Continues to become better organized
- Conditions expected to be conducive for development
- A tropical cyclone will likely form later today or tonight
- Formation chance (48-Hours): High – 90%
- Formation chance (5-Days): High – 90%

Central Pacific - Tropical Outlook



Disturbance 1: (as of 5:00 a.m. EDT)

- As discussed in the Eastern Pacific

Disturbance 2: (as of 5:00 a.m. EDT)

- Weak, near stationary low located 750 miles SSE of Hilo, HI
- Environmental conditions do not appear to be favorable for significant development during next two days
- Formation chance (48 hours): Low - 10%

Disturbance 3: (as of 5:00 a.m. EDT)

- Broad area of low pressure located about 1,100 miles SSW of Honolulu, HI
- Moving slowly NNE
- Has become slightly better organized
- Conditions appear conducive for some slow development
- Formation chance (48 hours): Medium – 40%

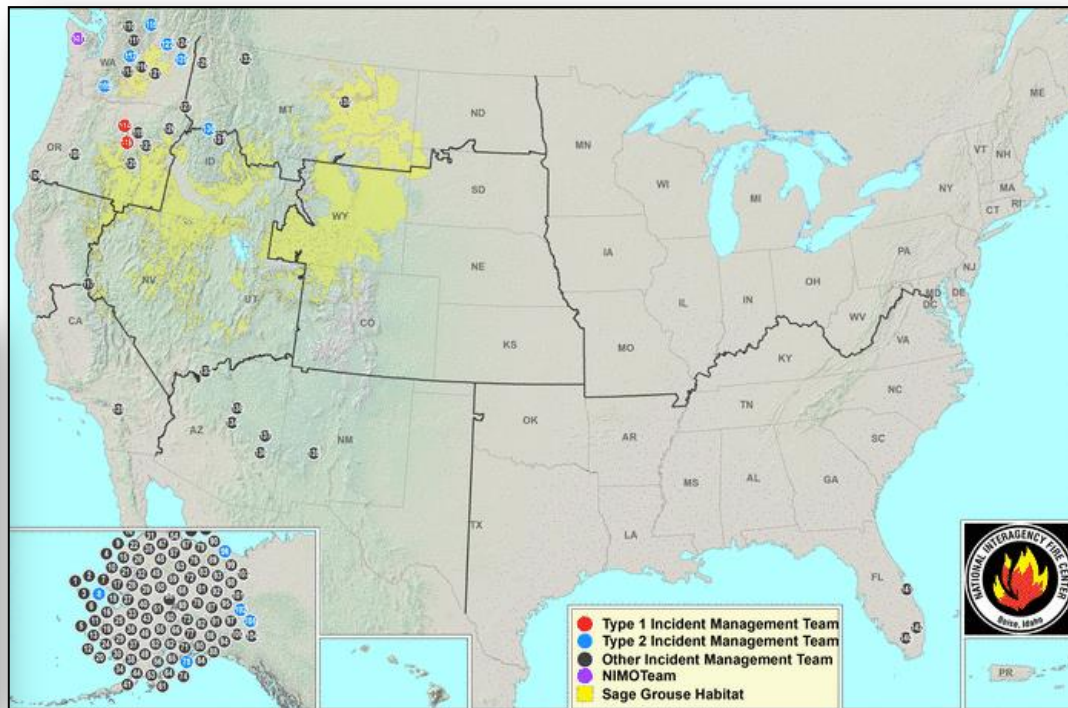

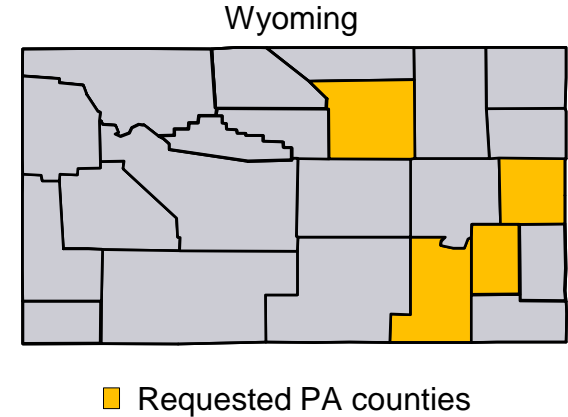

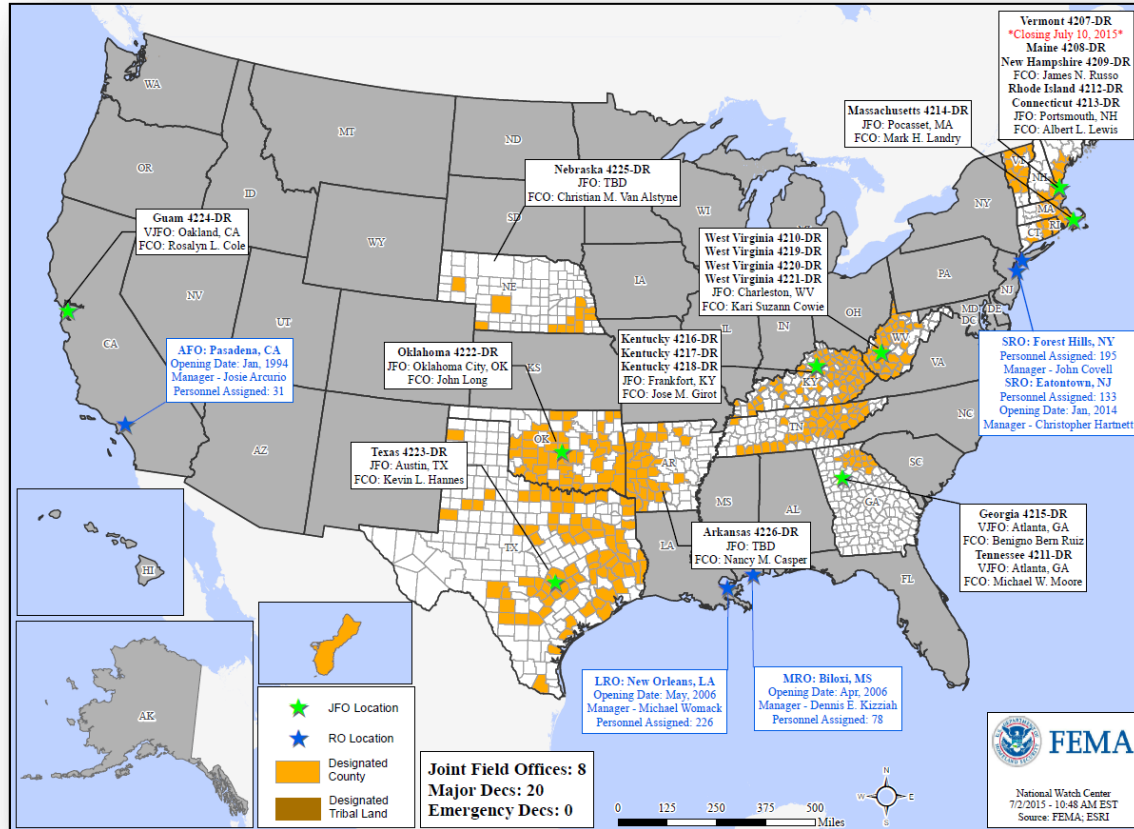


July 2, 2015

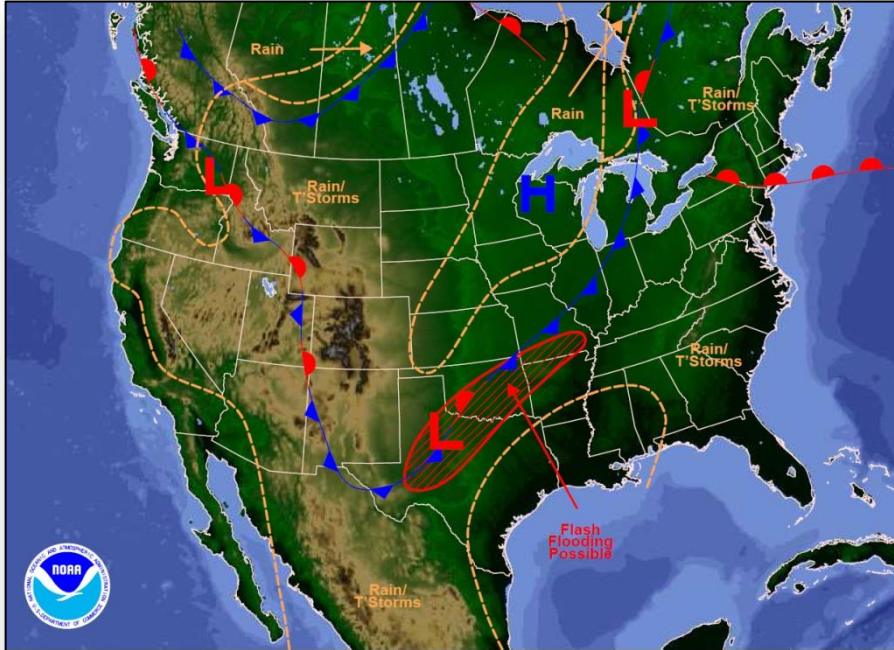

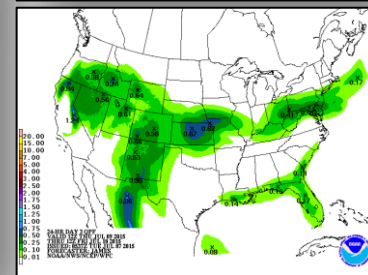
Precipitation Forecast, 1-3 Day

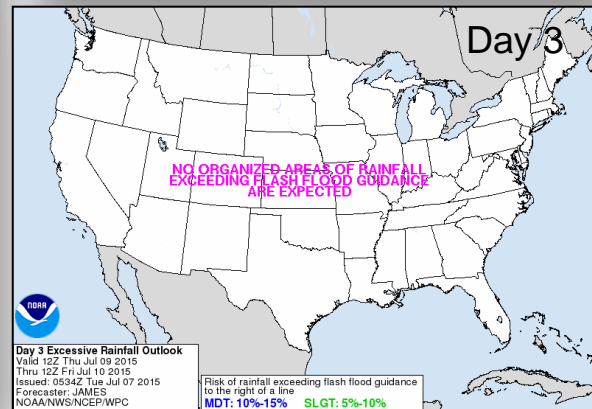
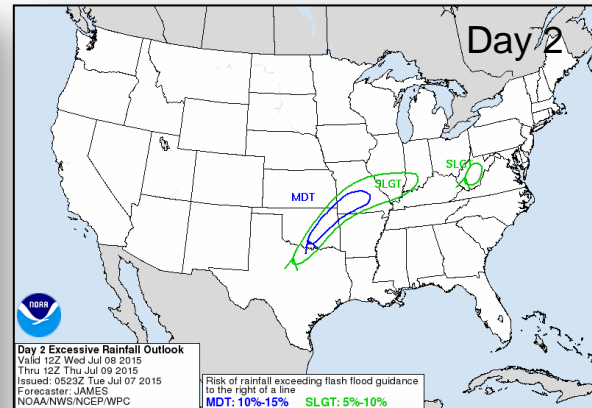
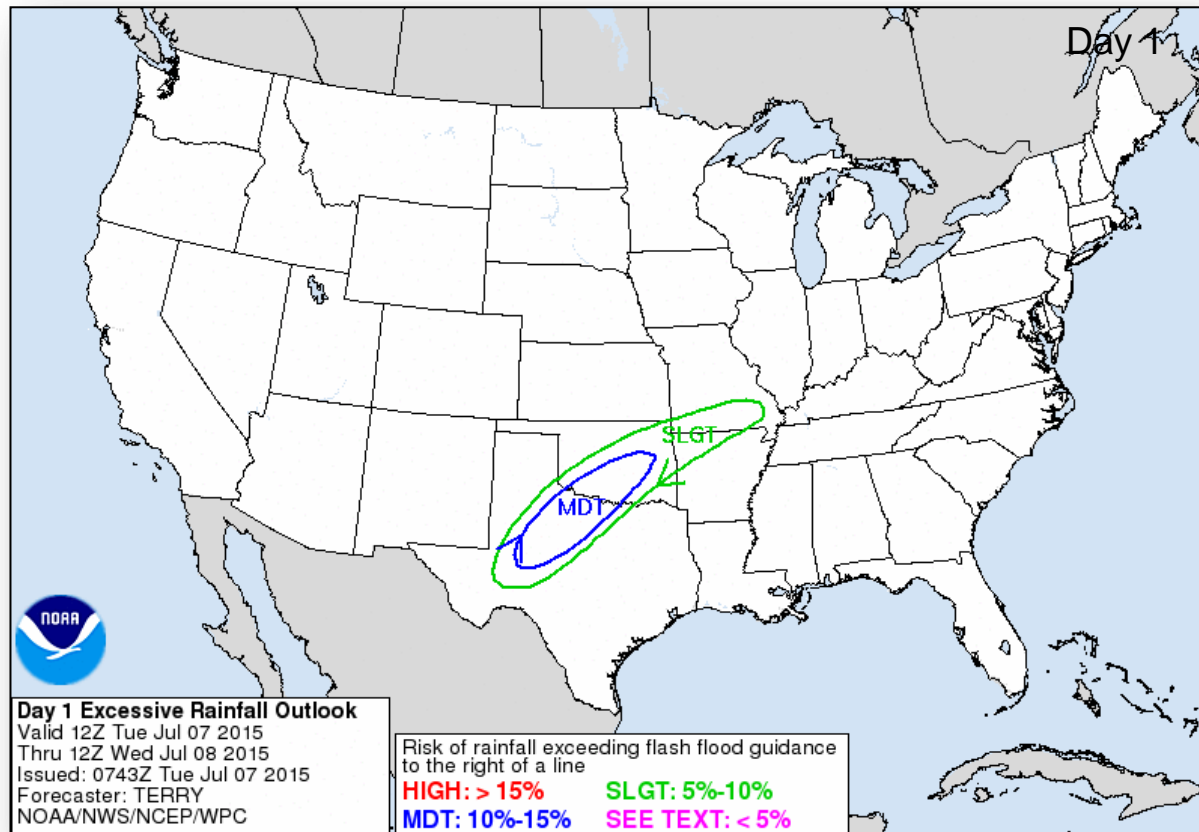

Flash Flood Potential



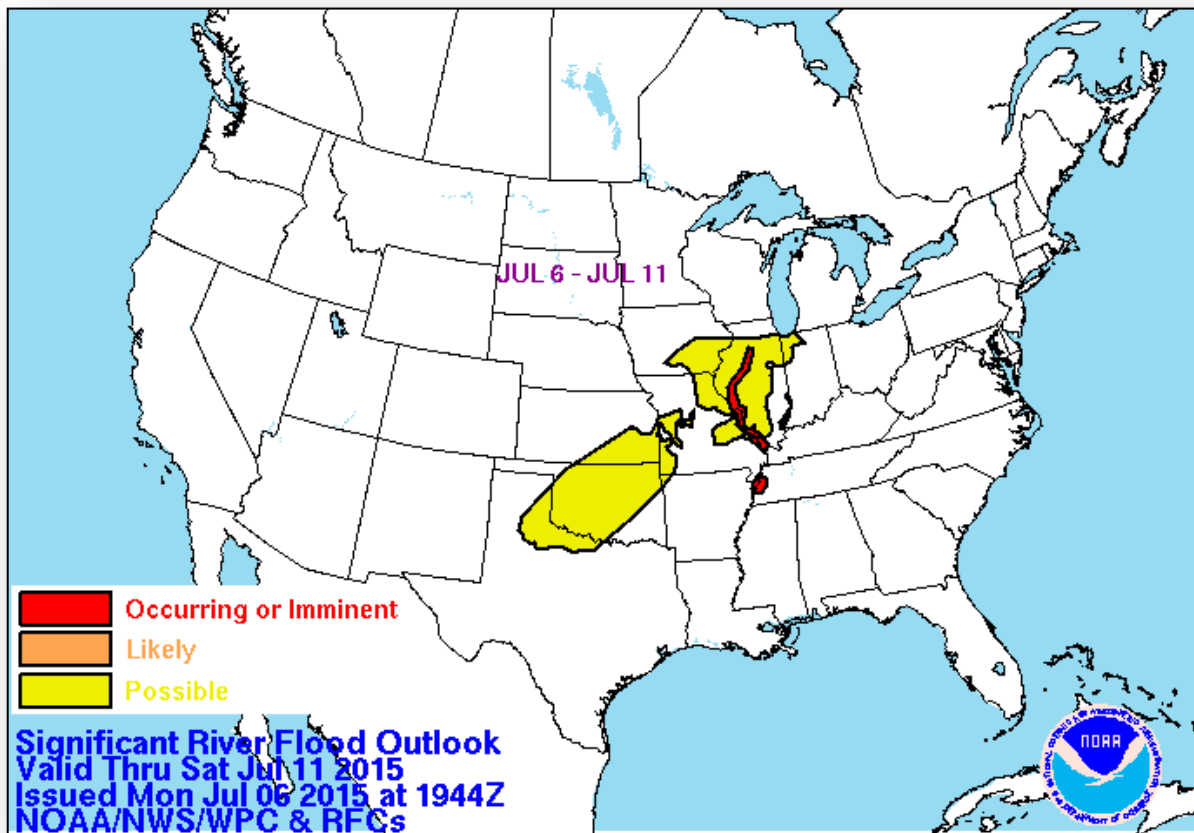
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Significant River Flood Outlook



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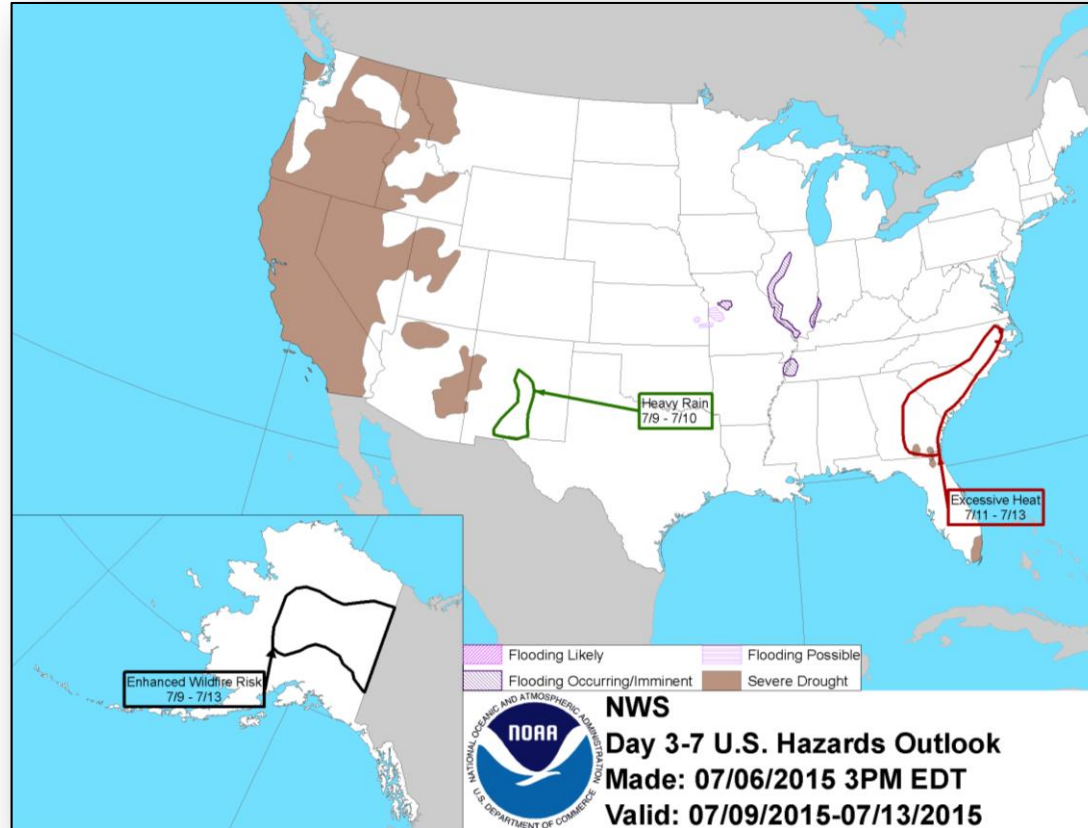

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Fire Weather Outlook, Days 1-8

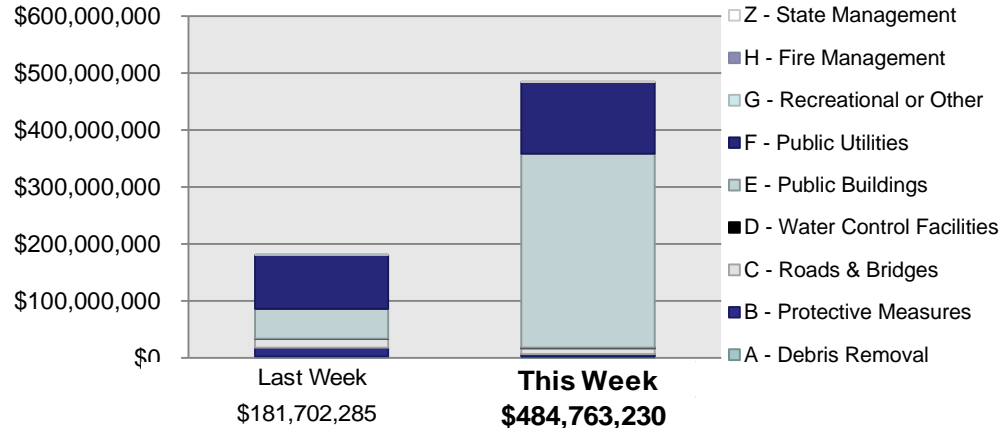

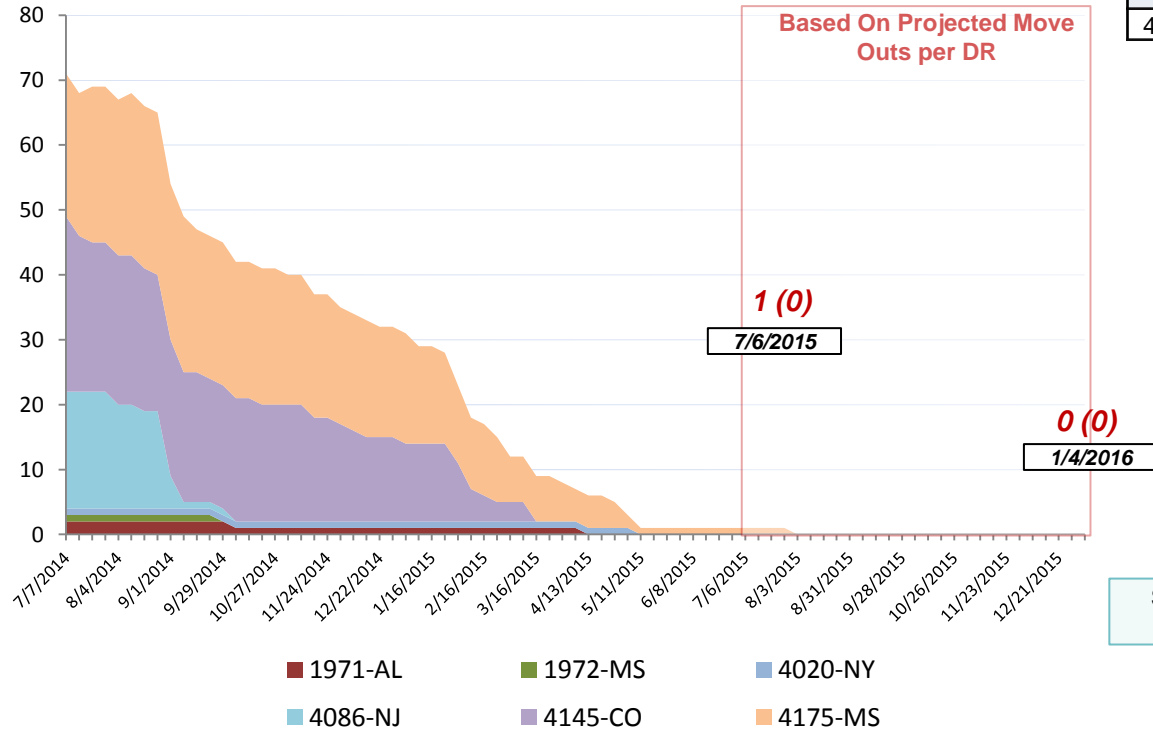

- On 6/30 a Category E grant for over \$331 million was obligated for Bellevue Hospital for damages resulting from DR-4085, Hurricane Sandy

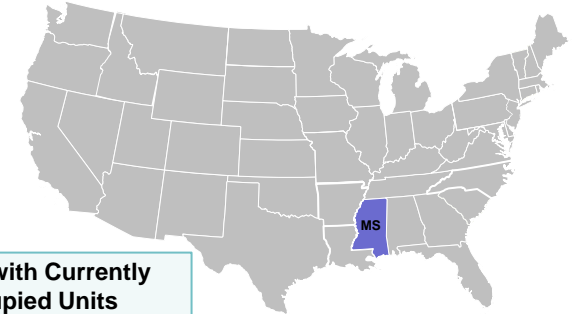

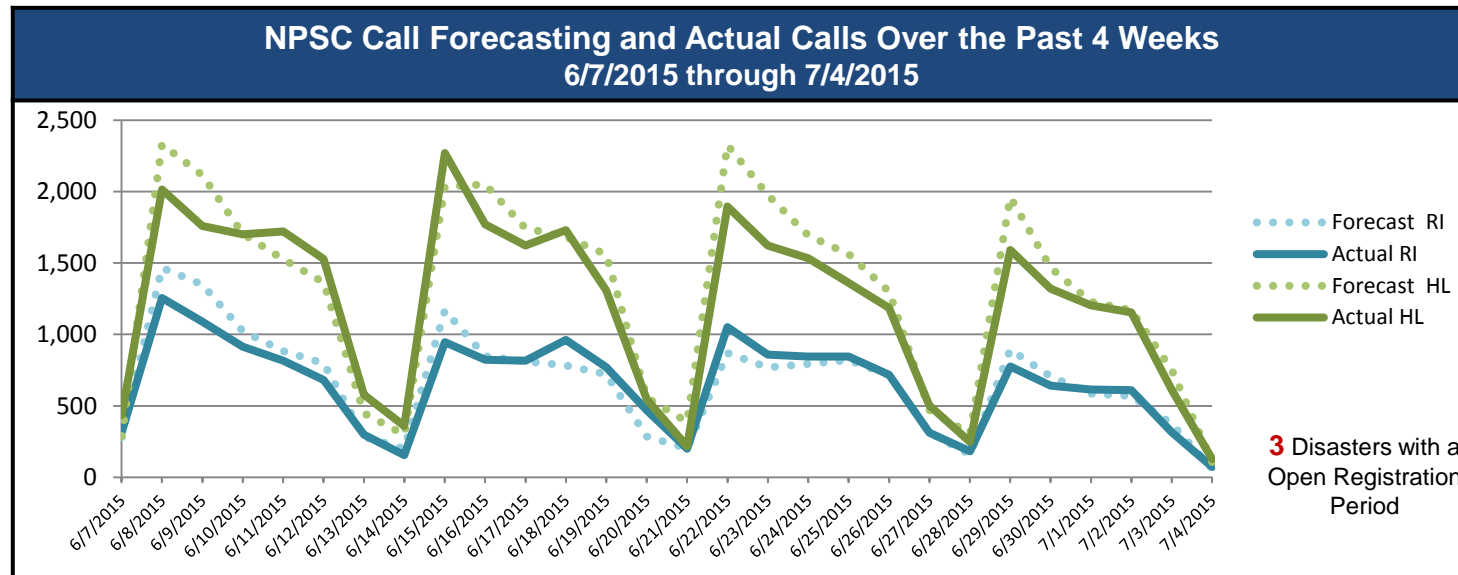


States with Currently Occupied Units

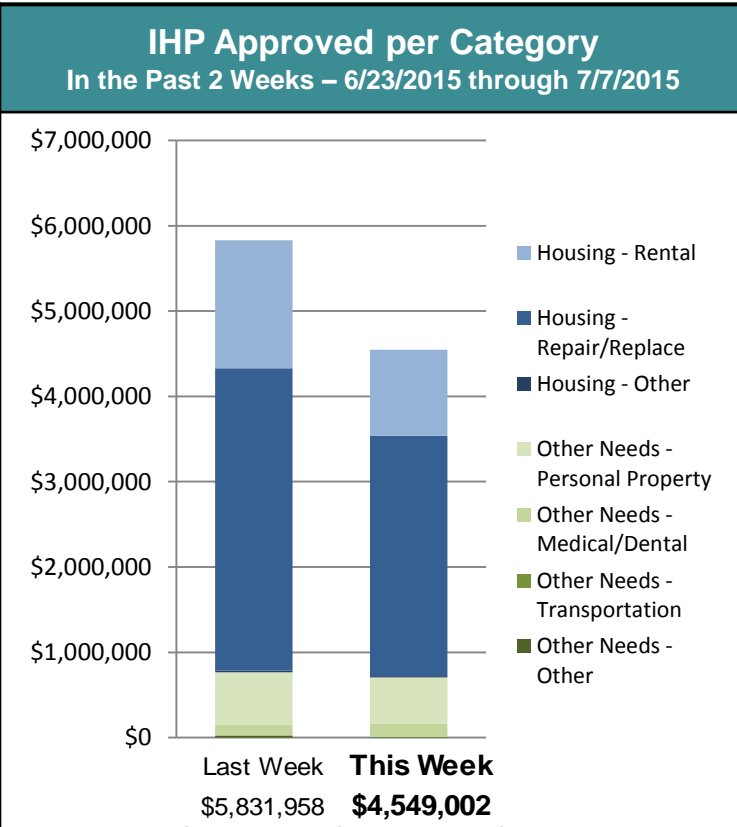
