


Situation:

- Very little rainfall expected over next few days; all significant river levels have crested & rivers will gradually recede
- Although river conditions are improving, flood conditions will persist for a few weeks, especially in eastern SC

Impacts - South Carolina:

- Fatalities: 19 confirmed storm related fatalities (no change)
- Shelters: 13 (-8) shelters open w/ 356 (-173) occupants (Region IV Update, 2:30 am EDT)
- · Water: Hospitals/public requirements met, no unmet needs identified
- Dams: 20 confirmed breaches (all earthen dams)
- Transportation: 225 (-4) road and 103 (-2) bridge closures statewide
 - Portions of I-95 are open for local traffic only (closed from MM 119 to 135)
 - · Full service expected to be restored to Amtrak today
 - · Most CSX rail closures expected to be back online by Tuesday
 - Norfolk Southern operations restored on most key rail lines except for Columbia-Spartanburg Line; will take 2-3 weeks to repair
- · Schools/Government offices closed through Monday




2 Day Tropical Outlook – Atlantic





2 Day Tropical Outlook – Eastern Pacific






2 Day Tropical Outlook – Central Pacific





Central Pacific – Tropical Storm Nora








Precipitation Forecast, 1-3 Day






Precipitation/River Forecasts – South Carolina


